Conference chair

- 4. "The influence of Time: Individual and social determinants in temporal processes" Chair: Kai Jonas (University of Amsterdam) and Michael Vliek (University of Amsterdam)
- "Influence and motivated economic behavior"
 Chair: Kai Jonas (University of Amsterdam) and Michael Vliek (University of Amsterdam)

In each conference theme, speakers from all tracks of the KLI presented their research. The goal of this overarching approach was to stimulate fruitful discussions and exchanges that bridge the different tracks and shed new light on the topics by combining and integrating perspectives from different levels of analysis (i.e., intrapersonal, interpersonal, group and organization, and intergroup).
